VETERANS DAY

On November 10th we happily and eagerly celebrate the birthday of our beloved Corps. November is also the month we honor the living and those departed who made the supreme sacrifice to preserve our freedoms and those of freedom loving peoples throughout the world.

After four years of carnage in Europe, the giant cannons finally fell silent at 11:00 AM on 11 November 1918. On the eleventh hour, of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, the Allies and Germany signed an armistice. The Great War, The World War, the War to end all Wars mercifully ended and the whole world rejoiced. Thereafter, the eleventh day of November became Armistice Day in most of the western world. In Canada, it became known as Remembrance Day.

In the United States, Congress officially recognized Armistice Day in 1926. Twelve years later it became a national holiday. Unfortunately, three decades and two wars later, America realized that world order had been equally preserved by veterans of World War II and the Korean War. In 1954, Dwight D. Eisenhower, President, signed an act which changed the name of Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

In 1968, Congress changed the day of observance to the fourth Monday in October. Veterans Day had become just another long three day weekend. The reason for the holiday had been forgotten by many. Fortunately, public outcry rose steadily over the next ten years. Finally, bowing to public pressure, Congress reversed itself in 1978 and the eleventh day of November again became the day on which Americans observe Veterans Day.

By law, Veterans Day is set aside to honor our nation's military veterans, both living and departed, who served in time of war. The focal point for national observance is at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. At 11:00am on 11 November, a color guard that includes all military services executes "Present Arms". The President of the United States lays a wreath at the tomb, steps back, salutes, and a bugler plays Taps. A grateful nation has not forgotten.

We are here today to pay tribute and honor all veterans, but we especially remember our Marine veterans. All of us know what it took to earn the title "Marine" and once earned, it is something no one can take away from us.

As we celebrate this Veterans Day let us especially remember our too soon departed Brother Marines—Peter T. Mooney Jr., 02/10/19; John Kovalcik, 05/17/19, John was an early member of Lakeland, relocated to So. Carolina, was involved with local Detachment and National activities ultimately to become the 60th National Marine Corps League Commandant in 2014; Tyrell TK Rydgren, 05/20/19; John A. Ruckstuhl, 08/31/19. Rest in peace Marines. You will be missed. Semper Fi.




The gifts we seek for ourselves, we also seek for others. Pour out your blessing on our community, our nation and our world.

VA MISSION Act

VA's new eligibility criteria for community care, providing more choices for Veterans.

Some of you have been asking what is the new Mission Act from the VA.

The Mission Act gives Veteran's greater access to healthcare and VA facilities in the community, experience benefits for caregivers, and improved VA's ability to recruit and retain the best medical providers.

Under the Mission Act, you'll have more ways to access healthcare. This includes within VA's network and through approved non-VA medical providers in your community, call community care providers.

For example, if a certain type of health service isn't provided by the VA, he may be able to go to a non-VA provider, using a VA coverage.

To obtain community care, you must receive prior approval from the VA.

To receive care from VA or a Committee provider, you must be enrolled in VA health care. You can apply online, by mail or in person.

Happy 244th Birthday Marines!

So here we are. Another year has passed and we have accomplished much as a detachment. Yet we need to continue to look forward to the future in order to accomplish the goals of the detachment.

While we celebrate the 244th Birthday of our beloved Marine Corps, we must remember and continue to perpetuate the memory of the many traditions on which we pride ourselves as Marines. Tradition and the Marine Corps go back through the course of our 244 year history. Following are some of our traditions:

<u>The Marine's Hymn</u>: After the Barbary Wars of 1805, The Marine Corps Colors were inscribed with, "to the shores of Tripoli". After the capture of Mexico City in 1847, the words, "to the Halls of Montezuma" were added, thus becoming the origin of the opening words of the Marines Hymn.

According to tradition, the words of the Marines Hymn were written by a Marine serving in Mexico. However, the author remains unknown. During the John Philip Sousa era, Col Albert McLemire and Walter F. Smith, Asst Band Director attempted to trace the melody back to its origins. In 1878, it was reported that the tune was popular in Paris, appearing as an aria in the comic opera Genevieve de Brabant by Jacques Offenbach which was later confirmed by John Philip Sousa.

The hymn saw widespread use through out the mid 1800s and Copyright Ownership was issued to the Marine Corps on 19 Aug 1891. In 1929, it became the official hymn of the USMC.

Based upon a proposal from Gunnery Sgt H.L. Tallman, an aviator and veteran of WWI, the Commandant authorized an official change in the 1st verse, 4th line to reflect the change in the Marine Corps Mission on 21 Nov 1942. The new line read: " in the air, on land and sea". Shortly after the end of WWII, Marines began to stand at attention while the Marine Corps Hymn is played. This tradition continues today in honor of all those who have earned the title, "United States Marine".

The Eagle Globe and Anchor / The Seal of the Marine Corps:

Origins of the EGA date back to both the Continental Marines and the British Marines. Both services wore a device the represented a fouled anchor. After some minor changes, an eagle was added in 1834. In 1868, a new design was approved which consisted of the western hemisphere of the globe, intersected by the fouled anchor surmounted by a crested eagle with a ribbon engraved with the words Semper Fidelis. In 1954, President Eisenhower authorized the Seal of The Marine Corps as requested by Commandant Shepard. The new seal changed the eagle to an American bald eagle.

The Eagle, Globe, and Anchor insignia is a testament to the training of each Marine, to the history and traditions of the Marine Corps, and to the values upheld by the Corps. It represents "those intangible possessions that cannot be issued: pride, honor, integrity, and being able to carry on the traditions for generations of warriors past." Retired Sergeant Major David W. Sommers states, "the emblem of the Corps is the common thread that binds all Marines together, officer and enlisted, past and present... The eagle, globe and anchor tells the world who we are, what we stand for, and what we are capable of, in a single glance."

<u>The Marine Corps Motto: Semper Fidelis:</u> The USMC adapted the motto," Semper Fidelis" in 1883. There were 3 unofficial but traditional mottos used before Semper Fidelis. The first motto antedated the War of 1812 and was the Latin phrase for, "with courage—Fortitudeine". It was emblazoned on the brass shako plates worn by Marines during the Federal Period. The second motto," By Sea and by Land" was taken from the Royal Marines," Per Mare, Per Terram."

The third motto was," To the shores of Tripoli" as inscribed on the Marine Colors until 1848 when it was revised to," From the Halls of Montezuma to the shores of Tripoli. The Marine Corps motto," Semper Fidelis" or "Always Faithful" identifies the dedication that all Marine have for the Corps and our Country. It is a way of life. A Marine once said, "It is non negotiable. It is not relative, but absolute ... Marines pride themselves on their mission and steadfast dedication to accomplish it."

<u>The Marine Sword:</u> There are 2 types of swords authorized for ceremonial use today. The Officer's "Marmaluke" sword is the oldest approved sword. Tradition holds that the sword was a gift to Lt Presley

O'Bannon from the Ottoman Viceroy Prince Hamet in recognition of the Marines actions during the Battle of Derna in 1805. In 1825, Commandant Archibald Henderson adapted the sword as authorized wear for all officers. The NCO Sword is the second sword. Introduced by the 6th Commandant—Col John Harris, the sword honors the leadership of NCO and SNCOs in battle. It is currently the oldest weapon in continuous use in the United States Armed Forces. The Marmaluke sword is older but it's use stopped during the Civil War years.



<u>The Code</u>: Honor— Courage — Commitment. Our core values as Marines are based on these 3 values. Honor—respect for others is essential, high moral and ethical standards, honesty and character are part of our DNA. Marines are dependable and responsible. Our actions and behavior is expected to reflect Honor on the Marine Corps. Courage — Marines have an unique ability to overcome fear. We aren't expected to be without fear but to have the moral, physical and mental strength to overcome fear. Commitment — Marines possess a strong spirit of dedication and determination. Our Esprit de Corps is unmatched among other military services. It is so engraved into our DNA, we know without any doubt that our brother and sister Marines will always have our backs. It truly means, "No Marine Left Behind".

<u>The Title</u>: Each Marine whether officer or enlisted, has earned the title, "Marine". It matters not whether your went through recruit training at MRCD or through OCS, the training is basically the same with a few exceptions.

United States Marine

Continuing where I left off in the October 2019 Issue of the Grunt, Marines of the 1st Marine Division under Major General Oliver P. Smith were ordered to advance north to the Chosin Reservoir in November of 1950. While the X Corps commander—Major General Almond's orders were to advance as quickly as possible, Gen Smith's advance from Wonson to Hungnam and to the Chosin was done slowly and deliberately. This allowed the division to set up supply points and establish other resources in the area including a landing strip in Hungnam. This proved to be vital in the very near future. During the advance northward, the Chinese started to secretly move the 9th Army across the border. The 9th Army was estimated at about 120,000 plus fielding 12 divisions of 10,000 troops. They moved at night and carried 3-5 days of field rations. They hid in caves and

under camouflage during the day. The discipline was such that if they left any visible signs that they were there, their officers would kill them. Chinese troops from the PVA 42nd Corps had already been in the Chosin area and was charged with stopping UN attacks north since mid October. On November 14th, a cold front from Siberia slipped into North Korea for much of the winter. It brought with it temperatures as low as –36 Degrees Fahrenheit. In



addition to frozen ground, heavy snowfall, and icy roads, frostbite and inoperable weapons became major problems. The terrain was mountainous and in many place the single road was nothing more than one lane of gravel. Plasma froze in it's containers. Corpsmen would have to warm morphine injections in their mouths. Removing clothing or dressings from wounds would bring on the onset of gangrene.

By November 24th, the 1st Marine Division occupied Sinhung-ni on the eastern side of the Chosin and Yudami-ni on the western side. The total combined strength of UN Forces in the Chosin area was about 30,000 of which 25,473 were Marines. The estimated number of 120,000 Chinese troops can be essentially reduced to about 60,000 effectives at the onset of the battle. With the UN having air superiority, most (if not all) of the transports for the 9th Chinese Army were destroyed during the movement. Due to the extreme cold, estimates put the Chinese losses before the battle even began at about 35% leaving an average of 6500 to 7000 effectives per division or roughly 60,000 effectives on Nov 27th. The Chinese began their attack the night of Nov 27th, and was designed to annihilate the units they were attacking completely. The attack began along the road between the Chosin and Kot'o-ri. At Yudam-ni, the 5th, 7th and 11th Marines were

surrounded and attacked by the PVA 79th and 89th Divisions, with the 59th Division attacking the road between Yudam-ni and Hagaru-ri to cut off communication. Similarly, RCT-31 was isolated and ambushed at Sinhung-ni by the PVA 80th and 81st Divisions. At Hagaru-ri, the 1st Marine Division command headquarters was targeted by the PVA 58th Division. Finally, the PVA 60th Division surrounded elements of the 1st Marines at Kot'o-ri from the north. Caught by complete surprise, the UN forces were cut off at Yudam-ni, Sinhung-ni, Hagaru-ri and Kot'o-ri by 28 November.



As night came, three Chinese regiments of the 79th Division attacked the ridges on the north and northwest of Yudam-ni, hoping to annihilate the garrison in one stroke. Close range fighting soon developed as the attackers infiltrated Marine positions, but the 5th and 7th Marines held the line while inflicting heavy casualties on the Chinese. As day broke on 28 November, the Chinese and Americans were locked in a stalemate around the Yudam-ni perimeter.



While the battle was underway at Yudam-ni, the PVA 59th Division blocked the road between Yudam-ni and Hagaru-ri by attacking the defending Charlie and Fox

Companies of the 7th Marines. The successful assault forced Charlie Company to retreat into Yudam-ni, which left Fox Company commanded by Captain William E. Barber isolated on a hill overlooking the Toktong Pass, a vital pass that controlled the road. On 29 November, several efforts by the 7th Marines failed to rescue Fox Company, despite inflicting heavy casualties on the Chinese. Aided by artillery from Hagaru-ri and Marine Corsair fighters, Fox Company managed to hold out for five days while enduring constant attacks by the PVA 59th Division.

After the heavy losses suffered by the PVA 79th Division at Yudam-ni, 9th Army headquarters realized that the bulk of the 1st Marine Division was stationed at Yudam-ni, with a garrison strength that was double the initial estimate. Believing that any further assaults would be futile, Gen Song Shilun ordered the 9th Army to switch their main attacks toward Sinhung-ni and Hagaru-ri, leaving Yudam-ni alone from 28 to 30 Nov. At the same time, the US Eighth Army on the Korean western



front was forced into full retreat at the Battle of the Ch'ongch'on River, and MacArthur ordered Almond to withdraw the US X Corps to the port of Hungnam. Acting on the instruction of Almond and Smith, Lieutenant Colonel Raymond L. Murray and Colonel Homer L. Litzenberg, commanders of the 5th and 7th Marines, respectively, issued a joint order to break out from Yudam-ni to Hagaru-ri on 30 November. Faced with tough fighting between the blocking Chinese divisions and the withdrawing Marines, Smith remarked: "Retreat, hell! We're not retreating, we're just advancing in a different direction."

For the breakout, the Marines formed into a convoy with a single M4A3 Sherman tank as the lead. The plan was to have 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines (3/5) as the vanguard of the convoy, with three battalions covering the rear. At the same time, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines (1/7) would attack towards Fox Company in order to open the road at Toktong Pass. To start the breakout, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines (3/7) had to first attack south and capture Hills 1542 and 1419 in order to cover the road from Chinese attacks. The breakout was carried out under the air cover of the 1st Marine Air Wing. True to form, the Marines brought out their wounded and dead as well as most of their equipment. More to follow in December.
