We arrived at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum for lunch and a guided tour. The tour was informative and our guides, retired Air force pilots, were extremely knowledgeable and interesting. The parade was attended by General Neller, the Commandant of the Marine Corps and his wife with the guest of Honor being General Dunford, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and his wife. It was a night to be remembered by all.

Reveille on Saturday was at 0530 in order to have chow at 0630 with a departure time of 0800 to Arlington Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. We witnessed the changing of the Guard by the famed Old Guard from Fort Meyer followed by a Wreath Laying by four of our members, Paymaster and Adjutant, Peter Alvarez, Senior Vice Commandant, Mike McNulty, Junior Vice Commandant, Kevin O'Leary and Detachment member, Dot Patson. The entire ceremony is very moving and all who participated were honored to be a part of this memorable occasion. Following the ceremony, we visited the Marine Corps Iwo Jima War Memorial at Arlington. A visit here is always a contemplative, awesome and solemn occasion and one not to be missed.





The next leg of our journey took us to the Marine Corps Museum at Quantico. We enjoyed a lunch at the Tun Tavern, visit to the Gift Shop with the highlight of the visit being a guided tour by Docent Don Wall, who is a veteran Marine. Our tour took us through the following exhibits, World War II, Vietnam War and Korea. #### Editor's Page

Happy Birthday America,



On July 2nd, 1776, members of the Second Continental Congress voted to declare our independence. Two days later, the same congress voted to accept the draft of the official declaration which would be sent to His Majesty King George III as well as read on the streets on our fledging nation. These men were mostly doctors, lawyers and men of affluence. Some were landowners and farmers. In general, they all felt that King George III had violated the rights that God gives all of us. Thomas Paine just 2 years before had written, "These were the times that try men's souls" in his pamphlet called Common Sense. This pamphlet was the first document to publicly call for a separation from Great Britain.

The Declaration of Independence was mostly written by Thomas Jefferson and edited by both John Adams and Benjamin Franklin. Congress made several more changes before unanimously voting in favor of the document. I will include the words of the full document later on in this segment, but for now I want to focus mostly on the first 2 sentences:

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the eauses which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Kappiness.

While the first sentence is in of itself important, the second sentence is what our entire foundation of independence and our Constitution are based upon. God gave us rights that King George III was consistently removing or violating. Our freedoms are based on this sentence. We have the right to worship as we please, we have freedom of speech, we have the right to bear arms in our defense, we have the right to earn a living and provide for our families, we have the right to trial, we have the right to fair representation and the right to vote for the laws that govern our nation. We are a nation of laws and rules. In the June 2019 Grunt, I mentioned that protecting our freedoms was one of the main reasons why I enlisted and I think it was the main reason behind the cause which we all enlisted or signed up to protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.

Freedom, that word has somewhat new meaning in this day in age. People twist it's meaning to suit their own purposes. Our laws, based upon that one key sentence in the Declaration of Independence, are

constantly under attack.





What are our freedoms? We have the right to worship as we please—we do not have the right to force other religions upon people regardless of what they believe or don't believe. We have the right to freedom of speech—that means we have the right to voice our opinions but we don't have the right to force those opinions on others. It also doesn't mean that the news media has the right to infringe upon the rights of others for privacy. We have the freedom to bear arms in our defense—we do not have the right to go around shooting others nor do we have the right to kill another human being. We have the freedom to earn a living and provide for our families—everyone has the right to work and get paid appropriately—no one has the right to a "free "ride. We have the freedom to a fair and speedy trial with a jury of our peers—we do not have the right to fair representation— Our representatives need to vote their conscience in relation to what is good for the people not that of private interest. Too many of our politicians are career politicians who's interests are not those of the people.

From time to time, I run across something on social media that I feel obligated to share. The following is called," We Hold These Truths":

On July 4th, 2019 Americans will celebrate our country's 243rd birthday, born of a declaration that "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

After I retired from my "job" I became a school bus driver in the small town of Cottonwood, AZ. I drove all ages from pre-school to eighth grade and loved the interaction with kids. One Monday I challenged them. On the bulkhead over my driver's seat I wrote "We hold these truths to be self-evident." The first to tell me the meaning of that phrase would receive a silver dollar. I gave them a week. By the second day they were frantic and asked for a hint. I said I'd give them a huge hint. I said that the answer was "obvious." No one tumbled onto the answer. Not until Friday morning, refusing to get off the bus as they tossed nonsensical words about did a timid 6th grade girl say "Does it mean obvious?" On Monday, I presented her with her silver dollar and used the opportunity that week for discussion of why the signers of the Declaration of Independence risked their lives and their fortunes to declare themselves free from foreign governance.

Today, in my 79th year, I wonder how many of those kids, all voting age adults now, really do hold those "truths" to be obvious. How many of them have read and understand that the U.S. Constitution was written to protect those "truths". Of course they believe they are entitled to "Life". Unfortunately, many believe "Liberty" is a given, even as we pass the 75th anniversary of D-Day and the 74th anniversary this year of the end of a World War, fought to ensure the "truth" of Liberty. Also, unfortunately, many have come to translate the "Right" to pursue "Happiness" as a "guarantee" of happiness. But most unsettling is that there are those who, although they give lip service to it, don't quite get the "all men are created equal" part, as they strive to deny equal voice to those with whom they disagree politically.





Now on to my history narrative for the month. In June 1950, there was little inclination that there would be yet another major conflict. In was not quite 5 years after WWII ended and our armed forces were mere shadows of what they were at the end of WWII. In fact, June 1950 manpower of the Marine Corps was at 74,249 (total—both officers and enlisted) compared to 469,925 at the end of WWII or about 16% of the Marine Corps at the end of WWII. The Army, the Navy and the fledging Air Force had similar percentages of cuts in



man power between 1945 and 1950. Thus our armed forces were in no way ready or prepared to fight in another major conflict. Secretary of State Dean Acheson had recently made a speech concerning US policy and interests that the United States would willingly defend. Sadly, South Korea, which had been established in 1948, was not among those countries or interests. Thus in the predawn hours on June 25th, North Korea sent 8 divisions across the 38th parallel and invaded South Korea. Within 3 days the capitol city of Seoul was captured. President Truman authorized sending US Troops into South Korea and a Naval blockage. General MacArthur, the commander of US Forces—Far East, asked for a Marine Regimental Combat Team. The USMC responded and activated the reserve to begin rebuilding the 1st Marine Division for duty in South Korea. In the meantime, the 1st Marine Provisional Brigade was hastily organized. This was a 4725 man unit formed around the 5th Marine Regiment. It was organized on July 7th 1950 and set sail on or about July 14th. It landed on August 3rd in Pusan and was placed under control of the General Walker and the Eight Army who immediately placed it in reserve in order to launch the first serious counterattack since the beginning of the war. However, the fluid scope of battle in the early months of the Korean War within the Pusan Perimeter, required the use of this force as a fire brigade of sorts to stop breakthroughs in the lines and plug in gaps where it was needed. This was until it was pulled from combat for refitting and replacements in preparation of the Inchon landings as part of the 1st Marine Division. There is little doubt that without the

1st Marine Provisional Brigade, the Pusan Perimeter would have been overrun and US forces would have been evacuated by sea.

To our Korean War Veterans we give thanks and we remember what is often called, The Forgotten War".

The text of the Declaration of Independence begins at the lower part of this page and goes through to Page 11. I also included a listing of the signers. Couple of facts regarding the Declaration:

- The resolution for independence from Great Britain actually passed on July 2, 1776. The resolution to approve the declaration passed on July 4, 1776
- Official records indicate that there were 36 signatures on July 4, 1776. 56 signatures are on the accepted official document which is on display at the National Archives. The last signature took place on Nov 4, 1776 by Matthew Thorton of New Hampshire
- 3. 2 future presidents signed the declaration, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson
- Edward Rutledge of South Carolina was the youngest signer at 26 and Benjamin Franklin was the oldest signer at 70
- The same Syng inkstand used in the signing of the declaration was also used in the signing of the Constitution
- As the President of Congress, John Hancock signed first and in doing so, made his signature large enough so the King George III could see it without glasses

#### In Congress, July 4, 1776.

**The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America,** When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.--Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.

He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.

He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power.

He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:

For Quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:

For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:

For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.

He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.

He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people.

Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.






