


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Mission Statement of Marine Corps League

Greetings Marines,



I hope everyone is enjoying the summer months (not necessarily the heat) and hopefully everyone will have a chance to vacation and relax for a little bit.

I had a chance to get away for a while and enjoyed a trip to Bermuda by way of Norwegian Cruise Lines. Liz and I only needed our room key so we used a couple of trade show lanyards that I had lying around the house. I used the one I got from the MCL State Convention. I only experienced a couple of comments through out the week. However, at one of the shows that we saw called "Howling at the Moon Dueling Pianos" I experienced something that I've never felt before. It was the last night of the cruise and the way it worked, there were 3 musicians that rotated in and out on 15 minute breaks so that there were always 2 of them on stage all of the time. It was getting late and the one pianist was at the end of his last set. Up until this point they had been taking requests from the audience. He stood up and announced that this was his last set on the cruise and he had to play this song. He sat down and started playing God Bless the USA by Lee Greenwood. Everyone in the audience started singing with him and we were raising the roof at the end of the first refrain. All of a sudden he stopped and asked if there were any veterans in the house and invited us to stand up. He then proceeded to thank us for our service (there were only 5 including myself). He went back to playing the second verse (the third person had already joined in on the drum set) when he stopped mid sentence and invited the veterans to come up on stage. We all shook hands as we assembled on stage and he restarted the second verse with everyone singing along. By the end of the song, people I had never even seen before that night were applauding and thanking the 5 of us. I should note that I was probably the youngest of the 5. It's truly an amazing feeling that once doesn't get to experience in such a setting. It also helped that God Bless the USA is a song that brings out the patriotism in most people.

Music has a way of defining how we view certain things. Who among us doesn't get a chill when we hear patriotic songs such as God Bless America, You're a Grand Old Flag, Stars and Stripes Forever, National Emblem March, America the Beautiful just to name a few. I know that when I hear or play patriotic music, I get a strong sense of pride in our country. As many of you know, I am a trumpet player and I perform with the North Jersey Concert Band. We have 2 outdoor concerts coming up that will feature some patriotic as well as concert music. The first one is in Hillsdale on Aug 8th at 7:30 PM (Beechwood Park Bandshell) Parking might be somewhat difficult and you'll need to bring your own chairs. The second concert is on Aug 11th in Fairlawn at Memorial Park (rain or shine) at 8:00 PM. You'll need to bring a lawn chair. The performance area is just past Memorial Middle School. Hope to see some of you there.







Onward to the history lesson for the month. In the July issue, I focused on the ground elements of the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade. I'm going to focus on Marine Air's involvement this month. On August 3, 1950, 8 Corsairs of VMF 214 took off at 1630 from the USS Sicily CVE and proceeded to bomb and strafe targets in Korea thus announcing Marine Air's arrival to the Korean Theater of Operations. After their bomb loads were dropped they continued on strafing targets of opportunity. VMF 323



joined the fray 3 days later operating off of the USS Badoeng Strait CVE. Both carriers were positioned so close to the action that any requests for air support were usually in the air in minutes and over the operating area in a minimal amount of time. In addition, because they were operating so close, the Marine Corsairs were able to stay over the battle area longer.

MAG-33 aircraft were constantly orbiting on station over the front line as the ground forces advanced, and communications within the air-ground team were steady, from the tactical air control parties (TACP) with the battalions all the way back to the brigade headquarters. The air support system, controlled by the active presence of Marine Tactical Air Control Squadron Two and VMO-6 at brigade headquarters from August 6 on, was a complete success.



While the 5th Air Force exercised tactical control of the air war over Korea, the Marines operated independently as part of an integrated Fleet Marine Force in the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade. Their priority for close air support was always with the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade with Army and UN forces as a secondary mission. In addition to the squadrons operating

from carriers near the action, the 1st Provisional Marine Brigade had a control organization with in it. This consisted of three battalion tactical air control parties and one regimental TACP, each consisting of one aviation officer, an experienced and fully qualified pilot, and six enlisted technicians. In addition, there were the facilities and personnel of MTACS-2 at brigade headquarters, as well as the Brigade Air Section of the staff. There was also the Brigade Observation Section, consisting of the tactical air observer, three gunnery observers, and the light observation and rotary-wing aircraft of VMO6.

The foregoing gives an abbreviated description of the brigade air support system which operated very effectively through some of the most rugged fighting of the Korean War. In addition, brigade air in the case of

VMO-6 established so many "firsts" with their helicopters during the period that it was obvious that a major tactical innovation was in the making. An adjacent Army infantry regiment summed up the air component performance in the perimeter: "The Marines on our left were a sight to behold. Not only was their equipment superior or equal to ours, but they had squadrons of air in direct support. They used it like artillery. It was `Hey, Joe, this is Smitty. Knock the left off that ridge in front of Item Company.' They had it day and night. It came off nearby carriers and not from Japan with only 15 minutes of fuel to accomplish the mission." Marine Air's close relationship with Marine ground units is what made the Marine Close Air Support System so successful.






On Aug 17, 1942, Marine Raiders of the 2nd Raider Battalion, landed on Makin Island. They departed the next day after destroying a seaplane base, 2 radio stations and a warehouse while killing about 100 Japanese soldiers.

Aug 24, 1814, 100 Marines under Capt Samuel Miller fought in the Battle of Bladensburg defending Washington DC. They only retreated after almost being surrounded with a loss of 8 Marines KIA and 14 WIA.



Aug 21, 1968, PVC James Anderson Jr is posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor becoming the first African American Marine to receive the Medal of Honor.

On July 11th, 2019, at a formal Change of Command Ceremony at 8th & I, Commandant of the Marine Corps General Robert B. Neller relinquished the Battle Colors of the Marine Corps to incoming Commandant David H Berger.

Under General Neller, the Marine Corps began the process of modernization and upgrading the Fleet Marine Force with upgraded weaponry for both the infantry and air wing as well as posturing the Marine Corps for potential new missions in an arena larger than the counterinsurgency role that the Marine

Corps has been in for the past 18 years or so. General Berger is expected to continue and improve on the work that General Neller began when he took over in 2015.

General Berger was commissioned as an infantry officer in 1981 following graduation from Tulane University. As a Lieutenant and Captain, he served as platoon commander in 1st Marine Division, and later as Company Commander and Battalion Operations Officer in 2d Reconnaissance Battalion during Operation DESERT STORM. He also served on the Officer Selection Officer in Roanoke, Virginia. As a field grade officer, General Berger was an instructor at Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron One (MAWTS-1) in Yuma, Arizona; instructor at III Marine Expeditionary Force Special Operations Training Group; and served on the Joint Staff as a policy planner in the Strategic Plans and Policy Directorate, J-5. General Berger commanded 3d Battalion, 8th Marines from 2002 to 2004, deploying the battalion first to Okinawa, and later to Haiti in support of Operation SECURE TOMORROW. As a Colonel, General Berger commanded Regimental Combat Team 8 in Fallujah, Iraq during Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. While serving as Assistant Division Commander of 2d Marine Division, he was appointed to the rank of Brigadier General. He then deployed to Kosovo, where he served for one year as Chief of Staff for KFOR Headquarters in Pristina. From 2009 to 2011, he served at Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps as the Director of Operations in the Department of Plans, Policies, and Operations. In 2012, he deployed to Afghanistan as the Commanding General of 1st Marine Division (Forward) in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. In July 2014, General Berger was promoted to Lieutenant General and assumed command of I Marine Expeditionary Force and subsequently assumed command of U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Pacific. On 28 August 2018, General Berger assumed responsibility as the Commanding General, Marine Corps Combat Development Command, and the Deputy Commandant for Combat Development and Integration, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps. In addition to a B.S. in Engineering, he holds a Master of International Public Policy from Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies, and a M.S. in Military Studies. His formal military education Includes the U.S. Army Infantry Officer Advanced Course, U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College, and U.S. Marine Corps School of Advanced Warfighting. He is a graduate of the U.S. Army Ranger School, Jumpmaster School, U.S. Navy Dive School, and U.S. Marine Corps Amphibious Reconnaissance School.

General Berger is the 38th Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Commandants of the Marine Corps

Thirty-eight men have served as the commandant of the Marine Corps. The first commandant was Samuel Nicholas, who took office as a captain, though there was no office titled "Commandant" at the time, and the Second Continental Congress had authorized that the senior-most Marine could take a rank up to Colonel. The longest-serving was Archibald Henderson, sometimes referred to as the "Grand old man of the Marine Corps" due to his thirty-nine-year tenure. In the history of the United States Marine Corps, only one Commandant has ever been fired from the job: Anthony Gale, as a result of a court-martial in 1820.

Other Facts about Commandants of the Marine Corps:

- 1. Archibald Henderson was the longest serving Commandant at 38 years and 81 days.
- 2. Jacob Zeilin was the first Commandant to be appointed as a General Officer.
- 3. John A. Lejeune is credited with establishing the Birthday Ball and the Marine Corps League
- 4. Alexander A. Vandergrift was the first Commandant to be appointed the rank of General.
- 5. Robert Barrow was the last WWII Veteran to serve as commandant.
- 6. 4 Commandants were Medal of Honor Recipients—Louis H Wilson Jr, David M. Shoup, Alexander Vandergrift and Wendell C. Neville.
- 2 Commandants were court martialed Franklin Wharton (acquitted) and Anthony Gale (Guilty and removed as Commandant)
- 8. General Dunford was the second Marine to appointed as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. His term began in 2015.
- 9. The first Marine appointed as Chairman of the JCS was General Peter Pace in 2005 and he served for 2 years. He did not serve as a Commandant of the Marine Corps.
- 10. James T Conway was the first Commandant to have not served in Vietnam .
- 11. James F. Amos was the first Naval Aviator to become Commandant
- 12. William Burrows, the first De Jure Commandant is credited with establishing many organizations with in the Marine Corps including the United States Marine Corps Band which is the oldest military band and the oldest professional music organization in the United States.

Sergeant Basilone received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his gallant action during the Battle of Guadalcanal in 1942 and the Navy Cross posthumously for more heroism in the Battle of Iwo Jima where he was killed in 1945.


