The Chaplain's Desk April 2016

The Marine Chaplain; a tough job with no weapon for protection!

The Marine Corps itself does not have Chaplains (or doctors, nurses, medics, etc.), because every single Marine is a rifleman (combatant) first and foremost. The Navy supplies all of these personnel to Marine Corps units. Navy Chaplain's are assigned to a Marine Corps unit. They have several layers of training to go through as Navy Chaplains. The first of which is the general officer indoctrination course called "Officer Development School". This is different from "Officer Candidate School" (OCS) that line officers go through. Chaplains are staff corps officers, along with doctors, nurses, lawyers, psychologists, etc, and they receive their commission directly from the civilian world. The Navy has decided that they want them to serve, and that they have proven themselves through their course of graduate study, so they do not become "officer candidates" as line officers do (these are the people who drive the ships, fly the planes, and directly contribute to combat operations). ODS is really about learning how to be in the military, and it teaches basic drilling, discipline, military bearing, and general Navy knowledge. There is plenty of physical training, as well. Chaplains have special training that follows on after ODS. They go through a course called, "Professional Naval Chaplaincy - Basic Leadership Course", or just Chaplain School, for short, and it is held at Fort Jackson, South Carolina. Chaplain school consists of three phases: 1) Phase I is a lot of lecture time, a few "field trips" to Parris Island, Mayport, and local spots. 2) Phase II is called RMTEX, which is short for Religious Ministry Team EXpeditionary training. This is where chaplains, along with RPs (assistants) learn basic skills of how to handle themselves in the field. They learn land navigation, night navigation, cover/concealment, trauma / first aid, and general survival, combat skills.

Chaplains are designated as non-combatants by the Geneva Convention, and American chaplains are forbidden from carrying weapons (which is why they have RPs with them), so they are not training in how to fight, but rather how to survive and do ministry in a combat setting. 3) Phase III is called TEAMS, and this is where they learn the most current crisis intervention, suicide prevention, and other counseling skills and interventions. There is also follow-on training that chaplains who are assigned to Marine Corps units can do called CREST (Chaplains and Religious Personnel Specialist Expeditionary Skills Training). This is two weeks (eight for RPs) of field and combat training: how to handle oneself under fire, forced marches, survival skills, etc. It is held at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina and is typically grueling. Apart from these basic training related schools, a chaplain assigned to a Marine Corps unit that is being deployed will go through all of their deployment workups with them, and train side by side with their Marines.
