





I started writing this column about a week ago during the whole Immigration issue verses the wall. Based upon the above statement, you can imagine how angry I was with what's been going on. So here's how I'm going to approach it.

Our duly elected representatives in the Senate and The House have once again failed the American people. Regardless of where you stand on building a wall or not, they are directly responsible for protecting our borders. Illegal immigration is a huge problem that no one wants to solve. There are approximately 12 million illegal immigrants in our country now. About 65% of that number come from Mexico. The flow needs to be stopped somehow. That's all I'm going to say on this issue.

One of the many things that I enjoy about our detachment is how we all pull together to get the job done. It seems lately though, its always the same people that are helping out at events. I know many of us are older and have given a lot of time in the past. However that doesn't mean that we are off the hook. You volunteered when you joined the Marine Corps, You volunteered when you joined the Marine Corps League. We have a great thing going with the breakfasts and the Rose Events and more hands makes everything work quicker and better. We really need help at the breakfasts especially between 10 AM and 1 PM for clean up. The same applies to Rose Events. It's usually the same group of a dozen or so. So if you are able, please come down and help out. It will be greatly appreciated and it is to support the detachment.

Historically, there were 2 pivotal events in Marine Corps History in the month of February. The first one is The Battle for Iwo Jima and the second one is the ground element of Operation Desert Storm.

On February 19, 1945, Marines from the 3rd, 4th and 5th Marine Divisions with the Army 147th Regiment landed on the Japanese island of Iwo Jima. The pre-invasion bombardments from the naval elements of the invasion force did little to soften the island's defense. The Japanese, which had been fortifying the defenses since March of 1944, had time to develop a sizeable series of interconnected tunnels which had solid steel blast doors to protect their

artillery assets. After waiting for a build up on the beaches for about an hour or so, the Japanese defenders opened up and the Battle for Iwo began. On the fourth day with the narrowest part of the island somewhat secured and the defenders on Mount Suribachi isolated from the rest of the island, a reconnaissance patrol was sent up the mountain. It met some light resistance and went back . A





stronger patrol was ordered to go back up and secure the crest. The were given the regimental American flag to put up once the crest was secured. Joe Rosenthal's picture became the most recognized photo of the war and the basis for the National Marine Corps Monument near Arlington Cemetery.

Joe's famous picture was not of the first flag that was raised.

Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal had just landed on the beach when the flag was raised and remarked that he would like to have that flag. Joe's picture is actually of the second flag being raised. For 36 Days, Marines and Soldiers fought a very tenacious enemy. In the end, the American battle plan won out. Simply put,



the numbers were on our side. It was however a very costly victory. Over 26,000 Marines, Soldiers and Sailors became casualties. It was the first battle in the war that Marines lost



more than the enemy. The island was declared secured on March 26th. The 147th Infantry Regiment took on the duties of clearing out the remainder of the Japanese. This took over 3 months. In fact the last 2 surviving Japanese officers surrendered in 1949.

Operation Desert Storm (continued from the January 2019 Grunt). With the start of the Air War portion on Jan 16, 1990, the build up of coalition force continued into February. For 42 days, the coalition Air Force, Naval and Marine aviation elements bombarded Iraq and Iraqi positions in Kuwait and in Iraq. Over 100,000 sorties were flown dropping over 88,000 tons of bombs on selected targets with only 75 aircraft lost. Of that number, only 44 were lost to enemy action with only 1 a result of an air to air victory. By February 24th, the coalition had achieved complete air superiority.

There were several skirmishes between Iraqi forces and coalition forces between January 29th and February 24th with minor advances into Iraqi controlled territory. On February 24th, the ground attack began with the 1st and 2nd Marine Divisions with the 1st Light Armored Infantry Battalion crossing the Kuwait border and

attacking toward Kuwait City. They encountered minefields, trenches, barbed wire and some light resistance. Usually the Iraqi defenders would put up a short defense and then surrender.



While the Marines and the 1st Light Armored Infantry Battalion continued their advances, coalition forces from the west began their attacks. As with the Marines to the east, the pattern was a stiff defense then surrender by Iraqi troops. There were several tank battles including one involving both the 1st and 2nd Marine Division at Kuwait Airport.

Upon learning of the attacks, Saddam Hussein issued a counter attack order to all of his units against all US Forces. On all fronts, the counter attack was successfully repulsed with severe damage to the Iraqi forces. On February 27th, Saddam Hussein issued an order to withdraw into Iraq. Coalition forces managed to insert blocking forces at the borders and in Iraq and successfully destroyed a large portion of the Iraqi Army including the vaunted Republican

Guard. One Iraqi unit did not get the word to retreat and for hours battled the Marines at Kuwait airport. Once the airport was secured, President Bush declared Kuwait liberated. The Iraqi forces continued to retreat along the Kuwait—Bagdad Highway which became known as the highway of death. On February 28th, after 100 hours since the Desert Storm Ground War began, President Bush declared a cease



fire and units that had advanced into Iraq retreated to the border. Unfortunately, 737 of Kuwait's Oil Wells were destroyed by the retreating Iraqi forces. The United States proved that the United Nations works in the post cold war era. Although Russia did not send any troops or become part of the coalition, they did give their approval to the UN Resolution.








Washington DC Trip

June 28th to June 30

Itinerary

Hotel in Washington DC, 20-24 rooms: Comfort Inn Downtown DC/Convention Center

June 28th: Depart 7:30am Oakland Elks Club, 33 Route #202, Oakland, NJ

We'll travel south to Washington through New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland. We will stop at the Maryland House on the way to stretch our legs and to get a quick bite to eat. The bus will arrive at the Air and Space Museum at approximately 1:00 PM. We intend to have a guided tour of the museum but since the Museum is closed at this time due to Congressional negotiations this won't be arranged till everyone comes back to work. From the Museum we will be taken to our hotel to check in, relax and have a bite to eat before going to 8th and I, as special guests for the evening Parade.

Depart for the evening Parade by 6:00pm Must be at the Parade by 7:00PM The Evening Parade is a marvelous display of planning and precision formations This parade is held at Marine Barracks in Washington DC, which is the "Oldest Post of the Corps." Marine Barracks has been used for many events since the early 20th Century including Presidential inaugurations and other special celebrations. After the parade and ceremony we will return to the hotel.

June 29: Breakfast at the hotel

We will be leaving early in the AM to go to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Special arrangements have been made for our group, and we will be there for the Changing of the Guard at 9:15 AM. At which time (4) from our group will have the honor to Lay the Wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. After the Ceremony we will take the bus to the Main building at Arlington Cemetery and we can then take the tram and have a guided tour of the Cemetery. If the restoration of the Lee Museum and Grounds have been completed we will have the opportunity to Tour the Mansion and Grounds. Around 1 PM, we will arrive at the Marine Corps Museum. At this time we are in the process of arranging for a Special Tour of the Museum and to arrange either a late lunch at Tun Tavern or early Dinner (Or Both at your expense). After this we return to our Hotel for R&R. Or perhaps some may want to see the sights and restaurants in the immediate area.

June 30: Breakfast at the Hotel

We will be doing an either or. If the weather is good, the bus will drop us off at Downtown Washington and everyone is free to sight-see on their own. Everything is in walking distance and we can see the Vietnam Memorial, the Korean Memorial, (my personal favorite) the WW2 Memorial, WW1 Memorial, the Women's Vietnam Memorial, to name just a few. If weather is inclement, we will all be taken to the Smithsonian Museum to tour on our own. Shortly after noon we will get back on the bus for our trip back home.

New Chemical Warfare


