COMMANDANT'S CORNER

Marine Corps League Lakeland Detachment—744 March 2019

Iwo Jima, otherwise known as Sulfur Island represented a strategically important air base which would allow fighter escorts to support long-range bombing missions against mainland Japan. The island would provide an emergency landing strip for crippled B-29's returning from bombing runs. The seizure of Iwo would allow for sea and air blockades, provide for the ability to conduct intensive air bombardment and provide the opportunity to destroy the enemy's air and naval capabilities.

The battle commenced February 19, 1945 and ceased March 16, 1945. Mopping up activities commenced after that to clean up the remaining pockets of resistance. The island was officially declared secured on March 26, 1945. This year marks the seventy fourth anniversary of that historic battle.

The seizure of Iwo Jima was deemed necessary, but, would not come easy. 70,000 U.S. Marines would be involved in the invasion. Total U.S losses amounted to 28,686 of which 6,821 were KIA, 19,217 were WIA and 2,648 suffered combat fatigue. Of the total number, Marine casualties amounted to 23,573. Japanese losses amounted to 1,083 POW's and over 20,000 est. killed.

We have two surviving members of the Battle of Iwo Jima in our Detachment, Gene Frederick, who was awarded the Navy Cross for his actions and Anthony Lechniak, who was a Combat Engineer. Both men epitomize the strong values that make up Marines. We should consider ourselves fortunate to have known these two Marines and to be present in their company. Well done Marines, the Lakeland Detachment and our country honor and salute you.

Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, Pacific Fleet/Commander in Chief, Pacific Ocean areas said it best:

"Among the Americans who served on Iwo Island, Uncommon Valor was a Common Virtue".

"It's a Wonderful Life" has become one of the favorite films of all time, viewed by millions during the Christmas season. Many who enjoyed this classic film may not know of Jimmy Stewart's faith and the difference it made as he served in World War II.

Jimmy Stewart (1908-1997) was already a successful actor when the U.S. entered the War in 1941. In 1935 Stewart took flying lessons at Minesfield, now Los Angeles International Airport, and by 1939 he had qualified for both private and commercial pilot's licenses.

With the continued escalation of the war in Europe, Stewart enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1941 but was not commissioned until January 1942. His family had a distinguished record of military service. Both of his grandfathers served in the Civil War, and his dad, Alex, saw combat near San Juan Hill in the Spanish-American War and served in World War I.

When Jimmy left home to go overseas, his dad was so filled with emotion that he couldn't express his thoughts. Soon Jimmy received the following note from his dad:

"My dear Jim boy. Soon after you read this letter, you will be on your way to the worst sort of danger. Jim, I'm banking on the enclosed copy of the 91st Psalm. The thing that takes the place of fear and worry is the promise of these words. I am staking my faith in these words. I feel sure that God will lead you through this mad experience... I can say no more. I only continue to pray. Goodbye, my dear. God bless you and keep you. I love you more than I can tell you. Dad."

Jimmy Stewart's war record included 20 combat missions as command pilot. After being promoted to squadron commander, he became operations officer, and from 1944 to 1945 served as chief of staff, 2nd Combat Wing, 2nd Division, 8th Air Force.

With the weight of leadership in combat, Jimmy Stewart learned to lean on the words of that tattered copy of the 91st Psalm: "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty. I will say of the Lord. He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him I will trust... Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night; nor for the arrow that flieth by day... For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways. They shall bear thee up in their hands, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone..."

"What a promise for an airman," Jimmy later would say. "I placed in His Hands the squadron I would be leading. And, as the psalmist promised, I felt myself borne up."

Editor's Page

Greetings Marines,



While there are several important events that occurred during the month of March in the Marine Corps magnificent history including the end of the Battle for Iwo Jima, there was one event that I felt fitting to cover in detail given our pending trip to Washington DC in June.

On March 31st, 1801, LtCol Commandant William W. Burrows rode with president Thomas Jefferson to look for "a proper place to fix the Marine Barracks on." President Jefferson was a personal friend of the Commandant, and was deeply interested in the welfare of the Corps. In as such, he felt it necessary to accompany Burrows on horseback to select a site for the new Marine Corps Barracks.

In 1800 the Capital of the United States of America was relocated to it's new site which had been secured from the states of Maryland and Virginia with the agreement that the capitol be located in a southern location rather than New York or Philadelphia. The trade off was to disperse expenses from the Revolutionary War which were mainly bourn by the Northern and Middle Atlantic States among all of the states with control from the federal government. The Southern States agreed with the condition that the new capitol be located in the south. In 1788 and 1789 respectfully, Maryland and Virginia voted to reserve a parcel of land not exceeding 10 square miles near the Potomac River as the new site of the federal government. In 1790, the Residency Act enabled the construction of the new capitol and allowed for the raising of funds to support it. The Residency Act also provided a statute that made this land separate from any state's control.

President Jefferson and LtCol Commandant Burrows chose a square in Southeast Washington, bounded by 8th & 9th streets, and A & I streets, because it lay near the Navy Yard and was within easy marching distance of the Capitol.






Eighth & I is considered the oldest post in the Marine Corps and the official residence of the Commandant of the Marine Corps. When the British captured and burned Washington DC during the War of 1812, they left the Marine Barracks alone as a tribute to the heroic defense put up by Captain Miller's Marines during the Battle of Bladensburg which delayed the British capture of Washington DC and allowed the government to escape. The Commandant's House is the only original

building in the complex as the rest of the buildings were reconstructed between 1900 and 1907. In 1974, the Marine Barracks, was entered into the National Register of Historic Places and declared a National Landmark by the Department of the Interior.

In addition to being the official residence of the Commandant, Marine Barracks currently is home to the following:

The Silent Drill Team, The Marine Band, The Marine Corps Drum and Bugle Corps, The official Marine Corps Color Guard and the Marine Corps Body Bearers. From 1920 through 2015, it also housed the Marine Corps Institute. In 2015, the Marine Corps



Marines stationed at Eighth & I have the following duties: Funeral Escort for Marines and other dignitaries, Ceremonial Honor Guards for state functions, security for Camp David and the White House Communications Agency, Friday Evening Parade and Tuesday Evening Sunset Parade at the Marine Corps Memorial during the summer months. There are stringent requirements of Marines that are stationed at the Marine Barracks. They must meet specific height and weight requirements, and pass a full background check since they are assigned to the White House and other State Department details.



Hotel in Washington DC, 20-24 rooms: Comfort Inn Downtown DC/Convention Center

June 28th: Depart 7:30am Oakland Elks Club, 33 Route #202, Oakland, NJ

We'll travel south to Washington through New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland. We will stop at the Maryland House on the way to stretch our legs and to get a quick bite to eat. The bus will arrive at the Air and Space Museum at approximately 1:30 PM and we will have a guided tour of the museum. From the Museum we will be taken to our hotel to check in, relax and have a bite to eat before going to 8th and I, as special guests for the evening Parade.

Depart for the evening Parade by 6:00pm Must be at the Parade by 7:00PM The Evening Parade is a marvelous display of planning and precision formations This parade is held at Marine Barracks in Washington DC, which is the "Oldest Post of the Corps." Marine Barracks has been used for many events since the early 20th Century including Presidential inaugurations and other special celebrations. After the parade and ceremony we will return to the hotel.

June 29: Breakfast at the hotel

We will be leaving early in the AM to go to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Special arrangements have been made for our group, and we will be there for the Changing of the Guard at 9:15 AM. At which time (4) from our group will have the honor to Lay the Wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. After the Ceremony we will take the bus to the Main building at Arlington Cemetery and we can then take the tram and have a guided tour of the Cemetery. If the restoration of the Lee Museum and Grounds have been completed we will have the opportunity to Tour the Mansion and Grounds. Around 1 PM, we will arrive at the Marine Corps Museum. At this time we are in the process of arranging for a Special Tour of the Museum and to arrange either a late lunch at Tun Tavern or early Dinner (Or Both at your expense).

At 5:30pm, we will have our farewell dinner at Globe and Laurel restaurant, which is actually the insignia of the UK's Royal Marines," Richard "Rick" T. Spooner (born 1925) is a former officer in the United States Marine Corps and the proprietor of The Globe and Laurel Restaurant in Stafford, Virginia just a few miles south of the main gate of Marine Corps Base Quantico.

June 30: Breakfast at the Hotel

We will be doing an either or. If the weather is good, the bus will drop us off at Downtown Washington and everyone is free to sight-see on their own. Everything is in walking distance and we can see the Vietnam Memorial, the Korean Memorial, (my personal favorite) the WW2 Memorial, WW1 Memorial, the Women's Vietnam Memorial, to name just a few.
