

## Gunny R. Lee Ermey

R. Lee Ermey, a character actor who drew on his experience as a Marine Corps drill instructor during the Vietnam War to portray the violent, howling sergeant in filmmaker Stanley Kubrick's "Full Metal Jacket," died April 15 at a hospital in Santa Monica, Calif. He was 74. The following excerpts are from the Washington Post Obituary dated April 16, 2018:

Mr. Ermey, an 11-year veteran of the Marines, had more than 100 film and television credits, including as a voice actor in children's television series and in the "Toy Story" movies, in which he played <u>the plastic soldier Sarge</u>. But he was best known for his gruff and profane roles in Vietnam films, beginning with a drill instructor part in "The Boys in Company C" (1978). He had initially been hired as a military adviser for the film but was reportedly cast after director Sidney J. Furie saw him teaching another actor how to play the role of the movie's foul-mouthed sergeant.

"Jesus," Mr. Ermey says in the film, delivering an <u>expletive-laden speech</u> to his latest batch of "maggots." "How in the hell do they expect me to train ... Marines when they won't even send me human ... beings to start with?" Mr. Ermey, who went by "Gunny," played an even more <u>nightmarish</u> <u>instructor</u> in "Full Metal Jacket" (1987), about a platoon of Marine recruits deployed to Vietnam. As with his earlier role, the part was inspired by his service as a drill sergeant at the Marine training center on Parris Island, S.C., where he said he and other instructors sometimes "raised a hand" to privates who failed to follow orders.

"My main objective was just basically to play the drill instructor the way the drill instructor was now let the chips fall where they may," he said in the 2001 documentary "Sarge!" As Gunnery Sgt. Hartman, Mr. Ermey took the art of the insult to sadistic extremes, threatening to "gouge out" the eyeballs of slow-moving recruits and then sexually abuse them. Mr. Ermey created about half his dialogue for the film, Kubrick said. "In the course of hiring the Marine recruits, we interviewed hundreds of guys," the director told Rolling Stone in 1987. "We lined them all up and did an improvisation of the first meeting with the drill instructor. They didn't know what he was going to say, and we could see how they reacted. Lee came up with, I don't know, 150 pages of insults."

Among Hartman's preferred targets was a misfit named Lawrence (Vincent D'Onofrio), a name that Hartman said belonged only to "[gays] and sailors." The sergeant dubbed him Gomer Pyle, after the simple-minded character in "The Andy Griffith Show."

"Ermey plays a character in the great tradition of movie drill instructors, but with great brio and amazingly creative obscenity," movie critic Roger Ebert wrote. "All situations in the Marines and in war seem to suggest sexual parallels for him, and one of the film's best moments has the recruits going to bed with their rifles and reciting a poem of love to them."

Mr. Ermey went on to appear in weapons-focused television series such as "Mail Call," which reportedly became the History Channel's highest-rated program when it premiered in 2002, and served as a board member for the National Rifle Association and a spokesman for Glock. He also served as a longtime spokesman for the Marines' Toys for Tots program.

"I figure I've fought the Vietnam War five times," he told the Associated Press in 1987, reflecting on his career. "The next time a producer calls up and asks me to take part, I'm gonna see if we can't win the ... thing."

Ronald Lee Ermey was born into a farming family in Emporia, Kan., on March 24, 1944. A selfdescribed "hell-raiser," he moved to Washington state with his family at 11 and said he was twice arrested for "joyriding" and "beer drinking" when a judge gave him an ultimatum.

"He said I could either go into the military — any branch I wanted to go to — or he was going to send me where the sun never shines," Mr. Ermey told an interviewer with the Civilian Marksmanship Program. "And I love sunshine, I don't know about you."

Mr. Ermey was rejected by the Navy before entering the Marines in 1961. His military career effectively ended eight years later when he was wounded by a rocket near the Vietnamese city of Danang. He bought "a run-down bar and whorehouse in Okinawa," he said, and still had shrapnel in his back and shoulder when he began studying drama at the University of Manila. (Washington Post April 16, 2018). Mr. Ermey or "Gunny" was a beloved representative of our Marine Corps and while we know of his character side, he was much more personable in real life. He will be missed.

# Why America Needs Marine Corps Values

A half a century ago, I spent the longest 13 weeks of my life at an outof-the-way place called Parris Island, S.C., then and now the home of the Marine Corps Recruit Depot.



We were strangers who arrived there in the middle of the night and were immediately relieved of all our civilian clothing and possessions --

including our hair. Standing there confused, apprehensive and bald, I remember asking myself over and over: What the hell am I doing here?



Then silently appeared in our midst a man in a starched uniform and polished boots brimming with self-confidence and a sense of command. This was the Marine drill instructor, the DI, who did not conceal his disgust with what he saw in us. I can still hear him that we were the sorriest collection of misfits and rejects he or anyone else had ever seen.

What followed was 90 days of splendid misery. Civilian habits, speech and attitude were marched and drilled and driven out of us. The DI was relentlessly democratic. He treated everyone on our platoon,189, with equal contempt while double-timing us 12 hours a day from mess duty to the rifle range and back. He used his personal term of endearment to remind us, "Maggot, remember, you volunteered to be here."

Somehow after more than three months of no Cokes, no beer, no TV and not even a day off, the DI, by then our Ultimate Authority Figure, reluctantly conceded that just possibly, maybe someday, we might actually be Marines. The combination of joy, relief and pride was unmatched. I was not a great Marine. I never saw combat. I got a lot more from the



Marines than the Marines got from me. But I believe fervently that this nation today needs the values of the Marine Corps as much as the nation needs the Marine Corps.

Of course, honor, courage and commitment are always in short supply. But the Marines teach personal responsibility and accountability by example, that any chain is only as strong as the weakest individual link. As a unit, we are stronger working together than the individual members can separately be.





Marines take care of their own -- and they take care of their fellow Marines before themselves. The well-being of the country and of the Corps is more important than our individual well-being. This may best be stated in the hard-and-fast Marine rule: "Officers eat last." The Marine officer does not eat until after his subordinates for whom he is responsible -- the corporals and privates -- have been

fed. Marines live by the rule that loyalty goes both up and down the chain of command. Would not our country be a more just and human place if the brass of Wall Street and Washington and executive suites believed that "officers eat last"?

The Marine ethic emphasizes responsibility to duty and responsibility to others before self. This is the very opposite of the unbridled individualism that elevates profit and personal comfort to high virtues. The selfish and self-centered CEO or senator who disregards and discards his loyal "troops" would be shunned in the Corps.



Civilian Americans must understand that the greatest civil rights victories have been won by the Marines and the U.S. military, the most successfully integrated sector of our national life. Why? No racial reference and no racial discrimination. The first time I ever slept in the same quarters with African-Americans or Latinos -- or took orders from them -- was as a private in the Marines Corps. Yes, America really does need more Marine values and influence.

Buckner, aided in suppressing the three-day prison riot at Alcatraz Penitentiary in San Francisco Bay. WO Buckner, a veteran of the Bougainville and Guam campaigns, ably led his force of Marines without suffering a single casualty.

**5** May 1983: In Beirut, Lebanon, a UH-1N helicopter carrying the commander of the American peace-keeping force, Colonel James Mead, was hit by machine gun fire. The six Marines aboard escaped injury. Colonel Mead and his crew had taken off in the helicopter to investigate artillery and rocket duels between rival Syrian-backed Druze Moslem militiamen and Christian Phalangists that

**8** May 1995: In the wake of the most devastating storm to hit the New Orleans area in more than 200 years, a group of Marines and sailors from Marine Forces Reserve demonstrated the quick response synonymous with the Navy/Marine Corps team. Within 24 hours of being called, Marines assisted in the evacuation of 2,500 civilians, and Navy corpsmen treated scores of flood victims.

**10 May 1945:** The 22d Marines, 6th Marine Division, executed a pre-dawn attack south across the Asa River Estuary and seized a bridgehead from which to continue the attack toward Naha, the capital of Okinawa.

**15 May 1862:** Corporal John Mackie, the first Marine to earn the Medal of Honor, was commended for service in the USS GALENA during action against Confederate shore batteries at Drewry's Bluff which blocked the James River approaches to Richmond.

*16 May 1945:* The 22d and 29th Marines continued the attack against Half Moon Hill, a day characterized by the 6th Marine Division as the "bitterest" of the Okinawa campaign. By the 18th, the famed "Shuri line" had been broached.

**23 May 1988:** The V-22 Osprey, the world's first production tilt-rotor aircraft, made its debut during rollout ceremonies at Bell Helicopter Textron's Arlington, Texas, facility. More than 1,000 representatives from the military, industry, and media, gathered to hear various speakers, including Gen Alfred Gray, Commandant of the Marine Corps, praise the versatile rotor craft designed to meet

**29 May 1991:** Elements of a joint task force that included the 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade departed the Bay of Bengal off the coast of Bangladesh after nearly two weeks of disaster relief operations following a devastating cyclone. The joint task force delivered tons of relief supplies using helicopters, C-130s, and landing craft in Operation Sea Angel.

**22 May 1912:** First Lieutenant Alfred A. Cunningham, the first Marine officer to be assigned to "duty in connection with aviation" by Major General Commandant William P. Biddle, reported for aviation training at the Naval Aviation Camp at Annapolis, Maryland, and Marine aviation had its official beginning.

**26 May 1969:** Operation Pipestone Canyon began when the 1st Battalion, 26th Marines and 3d Battalion, 5th Marines began sweeps in the Dodge City/Go Noi areas southwest of Da Nang. It terminated at the end of June with 610 enemy killed in action at a cost of 34 Marines killed.


