

The link below is a map of the location and a list of the Venders for this event. Our spot is #111 on Ridge Rd.



Editor's Page



Happy Fall Marines,

Isn't it amazing how fast time flies? Just a short while ago, we were in the midst of one of one of the wettest summers in history. Reservoirs are filled to capacity for the first time in many years. Hopefully the weather for fall will be nice and autumn like with average temperatures and sunny days. Especially for the Rose Events—please see the schedule on page 14.

In Marine Corps History there were many things that happened including what is arguably the birth of the Corps. We all know that Samuel Nicholas was appointed as the First Commandant of the Marine Corps and Robert Mullen (Owner of Tun Tavern) the first Captain and first recruiter. We celebrate the recognized birthday of the Marine Corps on November 10th. However, when the 2nd Continental Congress authorized the securing of 2 armed ships under the "Continental Risqué and Pay" policy on October 5, 1775, it also authorized the "proper encouragement" of Marines and Seamen to serve as crews on both ships. It was the first known recorded mention of Marines in Congress.

The Corps fought in many battles during October including the Meuse-Argonne Offensive of WWI, The Banana Wars in Haiti and Nicaragua between 1910 and 1934, Guadalcanal, the Gilbert and Marshall Islands Campaign, several battles during the Korean War and the Vietnam War. Of important note, is the first use of Vertical Envelopment on Oct 11, 1951 when HMR-161 air-lifted the 3d Battalion, 7th Marines and its equipment, using Sikorsky HRS-1 helicopters during Operation Bumblebee, northeast of Yanggu, Korea to frontline combat positions. While use of the helicopter in this role during the Korean War was rather limited, it laid the ground work for the intense and successful helicopter war in Vietnam.







The successful invasion of Inchon, allowed the recapture and return of Seoul to South Korean control with in 2 weeks. The 8th Army began it's campaign north to eventually link up with the Marines north and east of Seoul. Marines fought with determination in this period and in a 2 week period had 5 Medal of Honor recipients most notably being 1st Lieutenant Baldomero Lopez who was killed on September 15, 1950 by covering a grenade shortly after climbing the seawall during the Inchon invasion (Pic on Page 14).

Historically, and not to be left out, in September of 1942, Marines of the 1st Marine Division continued to fight it out with the Japanese on Guadalcanal. In spite of intense tropical weather, attrition due to combat, disease and fatigue, lack of resupply and re-enforcement, the Marines of the 1st Marine Division, the 1st Raider Battalion, the 1st Parachute Regiment and MAG 23 continued to defy the odds against an enemy that was determined to retake the island.

This month, we also remember Sgt John Basilone, WWII MOH and Navy Cross recipient from Rahway, NJ. This year's Basilone Parade, is scheduled for September 23rd at 1300 hours in Rahway. Thousands turned out at the 2017 parade to celebrate the memory of Sgt John Basilone and other veterans.

At a recent meeting there was some discussion about organizing a trip to visit the weekly parade at 8th & I, The National Museum of the Marine Corps and other sites in Washington DC possibly in June or July of 2019. I for one would be interested as the 8th and I Parade is one of my bucket list items. If anyone is interested in organizing it, please discuss with one of the executive board members.

The Marine Rose

In 1778, during the War of Independence, the Marine Corps Rose was dedicated to those Marines who made the Ultimate Sacrifice for their country. This tradition was continued by the French during World War I when the Marines attacked the Germans in the trenches at Belleau Wood. Roses were planted by the grateful French people at the graves of the Fallen Marines. When and where ever you see Leaguers or Young Marines distributing these remembrances, take and wear one proudly.

THE PROGRAM: Started by Marine Eddie Gallagher from New York, designed to parallel the VFW "Poppy" program to provide funds for detachments to assist veterans and youth and provide other services to the community.

Health and comfort items for hospitalized veterans.

Support programs such as bingo or holiday parties for hospitalized or retired veterans in Retirement homes.

Scholarships - assist youth programs - Humanitarian Aid

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS - Purchase roses from MCL National Headquarters, Ships Store - coordinate with local businesses or organizations to set-up a table or booth at their location - use a coffee or other type container as a collections can - Advertise what the Marine Rose Program is for and what the donations will be used for. - Conduct each year in conjunction with the Marine Corps Birthday, or whenever you feel it will be most effective. - Funds should not be used for the detachment's "general fund", to fund Detachment parties, cook-outs, Birthday Balls, etc. They should be used for the purposes stated above.

This day in Marine Corps History September

1 October 1997: The first African-American female colonel in the Marine Corps was promoted to that rank during a ceremony at MCAS Cherry Point, North Carolina. Colonel Gilda A. Jackson, a native of Columbus, Ohio, made Marine Corps history when she achieved the rank of colonel. She was serving as Special Projects Officer, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing at the time of her promotion.

5 October 1775: Meeting in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the 2d Continental Congress used the word "Marines" on one of the earliest known occasions, when it directed General George Washington to secure two vessels on "Continental risqué and pay", and to give orders for the "proper encouragement to the Marines and Seamen" to serve on the two armed ships.

6 October 1945: Major General Keller E. Rockey, Commanding General, III Amphibious Corps, accepted the surrender of 50,000 Japanese troops in North China on behalf of the Chinese Nationalist government.

8 October 1899: A force of 375 Marines under command of future Commandant George F. Elliott, attacked and captured the insurgent town of Novaleta, Luzon, Philippine Islands, and linked up with U.S. Army troops. There were 11 Marine casualties.

9 October 1917: The 8th Marines was activated at Quantico, Virginia. Although the regiment would not see combat in Europe during World War I, the officers and enlisted men of the 8th Marines participated in operations against dissidents in Haiti for over five years during the 1920s. During World War II, the regiment was assigned to the 2d Marine Division and participated in combat operations on Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Saipan, Tinian, and Okinawa, and earned three Presidential Unit Citations.

11 October 1951: A Marine battalion was flown by transport helicopters to a frontline combat position for the first time, when HMR-161 lifted the 3d Battalion, 7th Marines, and its equipment, during Operation Bumblebee, northeast of Yanggu, Korea.

19 October 1968: Operation Maui Peak, a combined regimental-sized operation which began on 6 October, ended 11 miles northwest of An Hoa, Vietnam. More than 300 enemy were killed in the 13-day operation.

23 October 1983: At 0622 an explosive-laden truck slammed into the BLT headquarters building in Beirut, Lebanon, where more than 300 men were billeted. The massive explosion collapsed the building in seconds, and took the lives of 241 Americans-including 220 Marines. This was the highest loss of life in a single day for Marines since D-Day on Iwo Jima in 1945.

28 October 1962: An 11,000-man 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade left Camp Pendleton by sea for the Caribbean during the Cuban Missile Crisis. One week earlier, the entire 189,000-man Marine Corps had been put on alert and elements of the 1st and 2d Marine Divisions were sent to Guantanamo Bay to reinforce the defenders of the U.S. Naval Base. Other 2d Division units and squadrons from five Marine Aircraft Groups were deployed at Key West, Florida, or in Caribbean waters during the Cuban crisis.

31 October 1919: A patrol of Marines and gendarmes, led by Sergeant Herman H. Hanneken, disguised themselves as Cacos and entered the headquarters of the Haitian Caco Leader, Charlemagne Peralte, killing the bandit chief, and dispersing his followers. Sergeant Hanneken and Corporal William R. Button were each awarded the Medal of Honor.

Note: This list is of recommended reading for all enlisted Marines. In order to fill the reading requirement, Marines must read at least 5 of the titles on the list in their particular grade every year. Once a title is complete, a record of completion is entered into the Marine's fitness report/record and/or part of their individual Proficiency and Conduct Marks. How a Marine demonstrates the completion of the requirement is at the discrepancy of the commanding officer. Marines may read titles from this list or the Commandant's Choice list with the long term goal of completing the entire list over time.

Breast Cancer Awareness Not Just For Women

"Even if the percentage of men diagnosed with male breast cancer is small, it is often more fatal for a large percentage of the men diagnosed. Since most men don't know to look for it, the disease is usually found after it has progressed to a more dangerous level."

Though the causes of breast cancer in men is still not totally understood, there are several factors researchers have found that may increase the risk of getting it.

Aging - Men with breast cancer, on average, are about 72 years old when they are diagnosed.

Family History - If other family members have or have had breast cancer the risk increases. About 1 out of 5 men diagnosed with breast cancer have a close, male or female, blood relation with the disease.

Liver Disease - Balancing levels of sex hormones is an important role of the liver. When the liver is not working well the hormone levels are uneven causing a higher risk of developing breast cancer.

Alcohol - The risk of breast cancer increases with heavy drinking.

Obesity - Fat cells in the body convert male hormones (androgens) into female hormones (estrogens) thereby increasing the risk if breast cancer.

Possible symptoms of breast cancer to watch for include:

- A lump or swelling, which is often (but not always) painless
- · Skin dimpling or puckering
- Nipple retraction (turning inward)
- Redness or scaling of the nipple or breast skin
- Discharge from the nipple

Changes aren't always caused by cancer, but see a healthcare professional if you notice any breast changes
