Service Officer Report

I hope everyone is enjoying the Summer, when it is not raining.

My first order of business is that I want to remind everyone that we have 2 events in September. The first is Pompton Day on the 2nd of September. This is an all day event, in which we will be collecting donations for the Rose Fund and selling Shirts, Covers and other items at our tent. It is always a good event, so if you can spend a few hours with us anytime between 9 AM and 5 PM it would be greatly appreciated. The Rain Date for this event is the 3rd of September, if needed. The event is being held on Lakeside Ave, along the river. We are not far from our Memorial. Just look for the Red, Marine Tent.

Our 2nd event is our monthly Bingo at the Paramus Veterans Nursing home at 1 Veterans Way in Paramus. Bingo starts at 2 PM and will last till about 3:30. We always have a great time with our Vets and nobody leaves without winning some money.

I want to take a few minutes today and talk about our VA Medical benefits. I know that just about all of you have your own private insurance and you will see your own private General Practitioners but I want to share with you that there is often a real benefit in signing up with the VA for some of your medical benefits. Particularly now that often Prescription Drugs are not always completely paid for by some of your medical insurance.

I suggest that you take a few minutes and figure out how much you are paying for your medical coverage. The VA offers medical coverage to all veterans who have served at least 2 years of service in the Armed Forces. They will give you 2 physicals each year and the cost for that is \$25.00 for that visit with your GP. If you need to see a specialist it will be \$50.00. Often you can schedule a number of appointments for the same day and you will only have to pay for 1 visit. The most that any prescription can cost you is \$9.00 for a month supply of pills, or \$27.00 for a 3 month supply of medication. My suggestion is that you check what it may cost you for your present insurance plan and consider if using the VA in some cases will save you money. If you are a Veteran who is receiving money for a disability that was caused from you time in service, and you are considered 50% disabled all of your visits and all of your medication is free.

I know that you might not want to use the VA for specialty care. There is often another avenue open for you that will allow you to use a private specialist that you know. There is a Program Called the "Choice Program" that in many cases will allow you to do that. It is a case by case basis, but it is something that will cost you nothing if you have a 50% disability with the VA. If you don't have a disability it will cost no more that your normal charges with the VA.

I am just trying to say that you have options, and I have found that often this option saves you money and is well worth your time.

As always, remember that John Harris and I are your Service Officers and we are here to help you.

Editor's Page



Happy September Everyone,

I sincerely hope that everyone had an enjoyable summer and had a chance to recharge your batteries because September is going to be a very busy month followed by a busy October. We have 5 Rose Events on the schedule between September, October and November in addition to the 3rd Saturday Breakfasts and some other events. We also have the election of officers in September and the installation of elected officers at the October meeting. Please see the Rose Event schedule on page 13 and a listing of other events on page 9.

I'm going focus a little bit on the Korean War this month or as some people call it, "The Forgotten War". On June 25th, 1950, The Soviet backed People's Army of North Korea crossed the 38th Parallel into South Korea. The South Koreans and the US were ill equipped and unprepared for this assault. In fact, South Korea was defined as not being under the US Asian defense policy which mostly concentrated on Japan and The Republic of China (Taiwan). Seoul was captured on June 27th and by the end of August the South Korean and US Army Forces were cornered in the Pusan Perimeter. However, with their supply lines stretched out and attrition though combat and fatigue, the North Korean advances were beginning to slow down. The 1st Marine Provisional Brigade of the 1st Marine Division had arrived and was beginning to turn the tide. Marine Aviation had also arrived and operating off of carriers in the Sea of Japan combined with sorties from Air Force bombers began to raise havoc on the long supply lines of the North Korean army. The North Korean Air Force was unable to protect the supply lines and the US Navy controlled the seas on both sides of the Korean Peninsula.

As early as July, General MacArthur ordered his staff to draw up plans for an invasion of Inchon in September. As Army units were re-enforced and supplies began to arrive to the Pusan Perimeter, The 1st Marine Provisional Brigade was withdrawn to Japan for re-enforcement and reoutfitting as part of the 1st Marine Division and tasked with the invasion of Inchon. While many thought the idea of an invasion at Inchon wasn't even feasible due to the insane tidal situation and the fact the landing craft would be strung out along a single ship access channel, strategically MacArthur's Inchon Invasion was pure military genius. Although fighting after the landing was stiff, Seoul was returned to South Korean control on September 25th after street to street fighting.

The successful invasion of Inchon, allowed the recapture and return of Seoul to South Korean control with in 2 weeks. The 8th Army began it's campaign north to eventually link up with the Marines north and east of Seoul. Marines fought with determination in this period and in a 2 week period had 5 Medal of Honor recipients most notably being 1st Lieutenant Baldomero Lopez who was killed on September 15, 1950 by covering a grenade shortly after climbing the seawall during the Inchon invasion (Pic on Page 14).

Historically, and not to be left out, in September of 1942, Marines of the 1st Marine Division continued to fight it out with the Japanese on Guadalcanal. In spite of intense tropical weather, attrition due to combat, disease and fatigue, lack of resupply and re-enforcement, the Marines of the 1st Marine Division, the 1st Raider Battalion, the 1st Parachute Regiment and MAG 23 continued to defy the odds against an enemy that was determined to retake the island.

This month, we also remember Sgt John Basilone, WWII MOH and Navy Cross recipient from Rahway, NJ. This year's Basilone Parade, is scheduled for September 23rd at 1300 hours in Rahway. Thousands turned out at the 2017 parade to celebrate the memory of Sgt John Basilone and other veterans.

At a recent meeting there was some discussion about organizing a trip to visit the weekly parade at 8th & I, The National Museum of the Marine Corps and other sites in Washington DC possibly in June or July of 2019. I for one would be interested as the 8th and I Parade is one of my bucket list items. If anyone is interested in organizing it, please discuss with one of the executive board members.

On August 23rd, a memorial service was held for member Frank Sanclementi at the site of his internment. The detachment was well represented and honors were rendered accordingly.



The Marine Rose

In 1778, during the War of Independence, the Marine Corps Rose was dedicated to those Marines who made the Ultimate Sacrifice for their country. This tradition was continued by the French during World War I when the Marines attacked the Germans in the trenches at Belleau Wood. Roses were planted by the grateful French people at the graves of the Fallen Marines. When and where ever you see Leaguers or Young Marines distributing these remembrances, take and wear one proudly.

THE PROGRAM: Started by Marine Eddie Gallagher from New York, designed to parallel the VFW "Poppy" program to provide funds for detachments to assist veterans and youth and provide other services to the community.

Health and comfort items for hospitalized veterans.

Support programs such as bingo or holiday parties for hospitalized or retired veterans in Retirement homes.

Scholarships - assist youth programs - Humanitarian Aid

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS - Purchase roses from MCL National Headquarters, Ships Store - coordinate with local businesses or organizations to set-up a table or booth at their location - use a coffee or other type container as a collections can - Advertise what the Marine Rose Program is for and what the donations will be used for. - Conduct each year in conjunction with the Marine Corps Birthday, or whenever you feel it will be most effective. - Funds should not be used for the detachment's "general fund", to fund Detachment parties, cook-outs, Birthday Balls, etc. They should be used for the purposes stated above.

This day in Marine Corps History September

- 2 September 1945: The Japanese officially surrendered to the Allies on board the battleship MISSOURI in Tokyo Bay. With General Holland Smith transferred home in July 1945, the senior Marine Corps representative at the historic ceremony was Lt Gen Roy S. Geiger, who had succeeded Smith as Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific.
- 5 September 1956: Eleven Marines from the 9th Marines, 3d Marine Division, stationed near Naha, Okinawa, drowned while swimming, from an undercurrent caused by Typhoon Emma. The violent storm, with 140 mph winds, struck the Philippine Islands, Okinawa, Korea, and Japan, causing some 55 deaths and millions of dollars in property damage.
- 6 September 1983: Two Marines were killed and two were wounded when rockets hit their compound in Beirut, Lebanon. Heavy fighting continued for the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit peacekeeping force in the area near their positions around the Beirut International Airport.
- 8 September 1942: On Guadalcanal, the 1st Raider Battalion and the 1st Parachute Battalion, supported by planes of MAG-23 and two destroyer transports, landed east of Tasimboko, advanced west into the rear of Japanese positions, and carried out a successful raid on a Japanese supply base.
- 11 September 1992: Hurricane Iniki devastated the island of Kauai in Hawaii in one of the worst storms the islands had seen in over a century. Marines of the 1st Marine Brigade based at Kaneohe Bay, spearheaded Operation Garden Sweep, the massive cleanup effort.
- 15 September 1950: The 3d Battalion, 5th Marines landed on Wolmi-do Island in Inchon Harbor and secured it prior to the main landing. The 1st Marine Division under the command of Major General Oliver P. Smith landed at Inchon and began the Inchon-Seoul campaign.
- 16 September 1814: A detachment of Marines under Major Daniel Carmick from the Naval Station at New Orleans, together with an Army detachment, destroyed a pirate stronghold at Barataria, on the Island of Grande Terre, near New Orleans.
- 18 September 1990: A new 40-acre training facility for Military Operations in Urban Terrain (MOUT) was dedicated at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, by General Alfred M. Gray, Commandant of the Marine Corps.
- 20 September 1950: Marines of the 1st Marine Division crossed the Han River along a six-mile beachhead, eight miles northwest of Seoul, Korea. Five days later, the 1st and 5th Marines would attack Seoul and the city would be captured by 27 September.
- 24 September 1873: One hundred and ninety Marines and seamen from the USS PENSACOLA and BENICIA landed at the Bay of Panama, Columbia, to protect the railroad and American lives and property during the revolution.
- 27 September 1944: The American flag was raised over Peleliu, Palau Islands, at the 1st Marine Division Command Post. Although the flag raising symbolized that the island was secured, pockets of determined Japanese defenders continued to fight on. As late as 21 April 1947, 27 Japanese holdouts finally surrendered to the American naval commander on the scene.
- 30 September 1945: Marines of III Amphibious Corps, commanded by Major General Keller E. Rockey, began landing in North China to assist the Chinese Nationalist government in accepting the surrender of Japanese forces and repatriating Japanese soldiers and civilians.

LSTs of the Inchon landing force stuck in Inchon's infamous tidal mud flats. The tides at Inchon had about a 30' difference between low tide and high tide often making the channels and harbor impassible by anything. This was one of the major obstacles that had to be overcome in the Inchon Invasion planning.

100th Anniversary of Women in the Marine Corps

This month we celebrate the beginning of the Women Marines. Opha May Johnson (nee Jacob) was the first women to enlist on August 13, 1918 as a clerk. She was the first in the line of 300 women to enlist for clerical positions in the Marine Corps Reserve so that their male counterparts could be freed to enter combat in Europe in accordance to the needs of the Corps. Although the first Women Marines enlisted in 1918 during WW1, they were disbanded and released from reserve service at the end of the war. On Nov 7 1942, Commandant Lt. Gen. Thomas Holcomb authorized the formation of the Marine Corps Women's Reserve. On February 13, 1943, enlistments for the Marine Corps Women's Reserve were open and Pvt. Lucille McClarren became the first enlisted woman. On March 13th, the 1st class of 71 Officer Candidates entered the U.S. Naval Midshipmen's School at Mt. Holyoke, MA to begin training with the WAVES. On March 26th, the 1st class of 722 enlisted Women Reserves began training at the U.S. Navy Training School at Hunter College, Bronx NY once again training with the WAVES. It would not be until 1948 that the Women Marines would become a permanent part of our beloved Marine Corps. These women paved the way for all women in the Marine Corps today. We are honored to have a couple of Women Marines associated with our detachment so please give them a thank you.

Honolulu Memorial is located within the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific Honolulu, Hawaii. 18,095 American World War II missing from the Pacific, excluding those from the southwest Pacific, and 8,210 American missing from the Korean War. These names were listed on the Korean War Courts of the Missing at the time of the dedication in 1966. Two half courts have been added at the foot of the staircase that contain the names of 2,504 Americans missing from the Vietnam War.

Notes: Information above taken from American Battles and Monuments Commission which is tasked to maintain 26 American Military Cemeteries and 29 American War Monuments in 16 countries.

*Some remains of MIAs listed on walls of monuments have been recovered and duly annotated by a floret next to the missing's name.

While researching pictures and stories for the Chaplin's page, I ran across this information and figured that it would be worth including in The Grunt.
